Tree Care Advocate Program Overview

Minnesota Tree Care Advocate is an organization of University of Minnesota trained volunteers throughout the state that are dedicated to community forestry. This program is currently comprised of **three** community forestry programs including **Tree Care Advisor, Citizen Pruner**, and **Tree Steward**. Minnesota Tree Care Advocate works to educate citizens of the state about their urban forests so that they, in turn, can volunteer in their neighborhoods and communities. The Minnesota Tree Care Advisor Program, founded in 1993, aids in the development of environmental stewards through education and the promotion of volunteerism. Tree Care Advisor volunteers provide communities throughout the state with a valuable pool of educated stewards to support and enhance our urban and community forests. Tree Care Advisors are asked to complete at least 25 hours of service toward any volunteer activities related to tree, shrub and vine care. Tree Care Advisors are also asked to complete 4 hours of continuing education to stay up to date on the latest research.

In 2018, 59 active Tree Care Advisors dedicated their time to volunteerism in Minnesota.



In 2018, Tree Care Advisors completed a total of 3,033 volunteer hours. From 1993 to the end of 2018, volunteers have completed a total of 105,687.66 volunteer hours.



Collectively, monetary contributions from Tree Care Advisors between 1993 and 2018 totals \$2,915,196.62 (based on 2017 figures).

The **"Ask a Tree Care Advisor" booth** in the **Eco Experience** building at the **Minnesota State Fair** has been staff by Tree Care Advisor volunteers since 2013. The "Ask a Tree Care Advisor" booth was originally a **one-time addition** to the Climate Change area, but an invitation from the **Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA)** was extended to return and has since become a **permanent** fixture. The public can ask tree and shrub related questions at the booth during all **12 days** of the Minnesota State Fair and youth can participate in the building-wide Bingo game at this booth. Over the past 5 years, 840 hours of open booth time has staffed by volunteers and UMN staff to interact with the public.

In 2018, approximately 576 hours were spent staffing, preparing, and commuting to and from the "Ask a Tree Care Advisor" booth.

In 2018, in excess of 3,301 questions were asked by the public at the "Ask a Tree Care Advisor" booth.

Tree Essentials are a collection of educational workshops offered nearly every Friday from July to early October on the St. Paul campus UFore Nursery. Tree Essentials cover an array of tree care topics and skills, with each date focusing on one specific topic. Tree Essentials workshops are taught by University of Minnesota faculty, staff, graduate and undergraduate students. All Tree Essential classes are open to the public, with a discount offered to Tree Care Advocate volunteers, Master Gardeners, Master Naturalists, and Minnesota Tree Inspectors.




In 2018, a total of 56 individuals attended Tree Essential classes over the course of 3 months.

Minnesota Citizen Pruner

The **Minnesota Citizen Pruner Program** aids in increasing local capacity by working with municipalities and engaging citizens in community forest upkeep. Citizen Pruners are trained in **tree biology**, **tree species identification and pruning restrictions**, **pruning techniques**, and **types of removals** the community requests volunteer to perform. Citizen Pruners are able to manage small branches near the ground while tree care professionals can focus on larger branches higher in the tree canopy. Completing this ground work is vital for clearing sightlines, blocked sidewalks, and **improving the health** of both young and mature trees.



Citizen Pruner Cumulative Hours & Monetary Contribution



In 2018, Citizen Pruners completed a total of 535.5 volunteer hours, meaning from 2013 to the end of 2018, a total of 2,398.20 volunteer hours have been reported.

Minnesota Tree Steward

The Minnesota Tree Steward Program is a community-based program where city/county staff or representatives will request customized volunteer education and hands-on training for its citizens. This education allows citizens to get involved with multiple aspects of tree care and to act as a leader and a second pair of eyes for the community. Activities vary based on the needs of the community, but generally fall into the categories of: best planting practices, watering, best pruning practices, and tree health monitoring. Volunteers may fulfill service hours either independently or by attending community hosted volunteer events.

In 2018, 12 Minnesota Tree Stewards dedicated their time to volunteerism and self-reported volunteer accomplishments.

The following data was collected for the following participating Citizen Pruner communities: *Arlington, Hennepin County, Maple Grove, Morris, and Richfield.*

Forest Resources Outreach Line


The Forest Resources Outreach Line has been staff by Tree Care Advisors since 2013. Minnesotans can contact the information help desk throughout the year via two ways: by phone or by e-mail. Once the phone or email messages are received, Tree Care Advisor volunteers research the resident's tree-related questions and provide them with a non-biased resolution to their questions and resources to support the resolution. In 2018, the Outreach Line was staffed by Annette LeDuc and Mary Magers. Since 2014, volunteers have answered 1,039 questions from the public.

In 2018, volunteers answered 281 questions from the public in total.

Forest Resources Outreach Line—Question Topics

Throughout 2018, many questions reached our volunteers. Below, you can find the breakdown of question topics.

Other topics include but not limited to tree removal, stump management, tree biology, critter damage, maple syruping, tree planting practices, tree appraisal, and finding an arborist.




In 2018, 120 of questions were received via phone and 161 questions were received via e-mail.

Forest Resources Outreach Line—Insect/Disease Questions

Below is the breakdown of questions regarding insects and disease. All other questions were not related to a specific insect or disease.

Other topics include but not limited to apple maggot, army worms, black knot, fall webworm, Ichneumonid wasp, lichens, pine bark beetle, sapsucker, and spruce bud worm.
